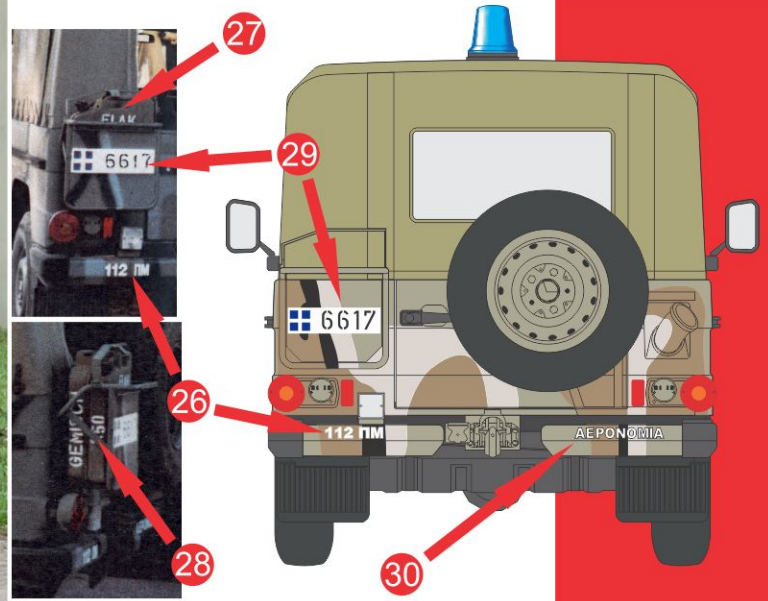


Mercedes 240 & 290 GD in Hellenic Service Set 2



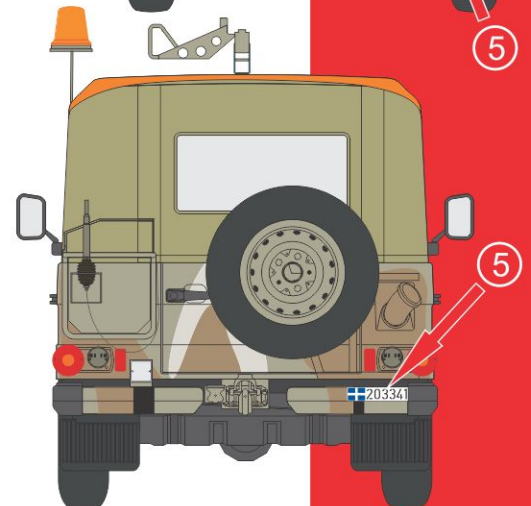
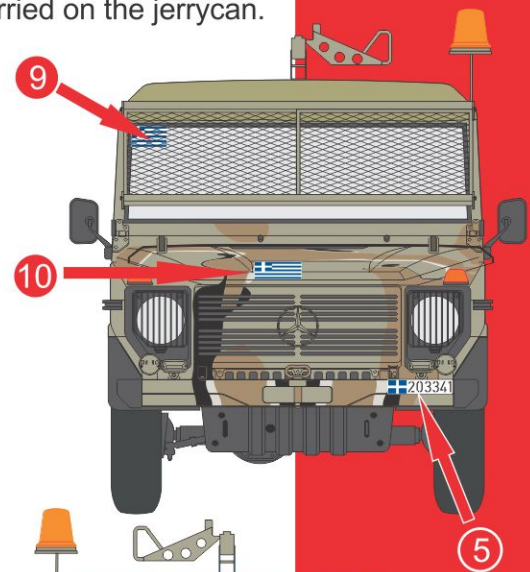
Hellenic Air Force Mercedes 240 are finished in the same 4 colour MERDC type camouflage as army vehicles. When they are repainted variations can appear in both the colour tones and the camouflage pattern. This vehicle was in service with the air force police detachment of the 112 Combat Wing. Some interesting, but unfortunately not completely visible, markings were carried on the jerrycan.



The vehicles serving with peace keeping forces abroad often have protective wire mesh fitted over the windows. The windscreen mesh has two sections, the one on the driver's side can be slid sideways to improve visibility when its protection is not needed. Most vehicles also had a

MG mounting for an MG3 machine gun fitted to the vehicle's roll-bar. The tarpaulin had had a opening section through which the gunner could stand to operate the weapon.

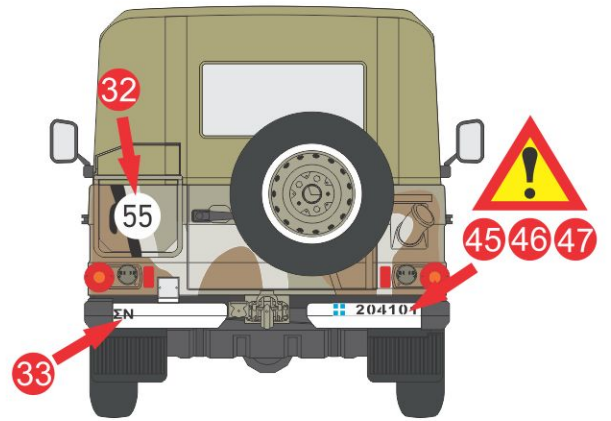
Orange air recognition panels were fixed on the roof.



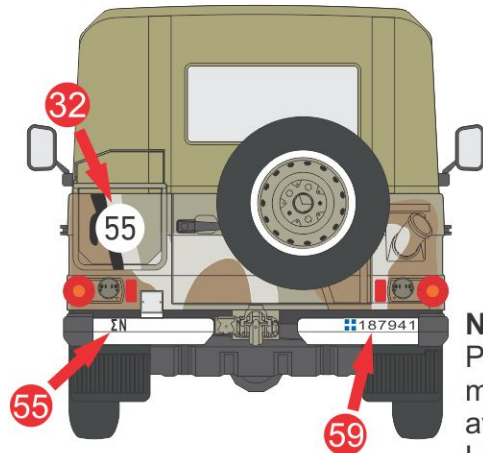

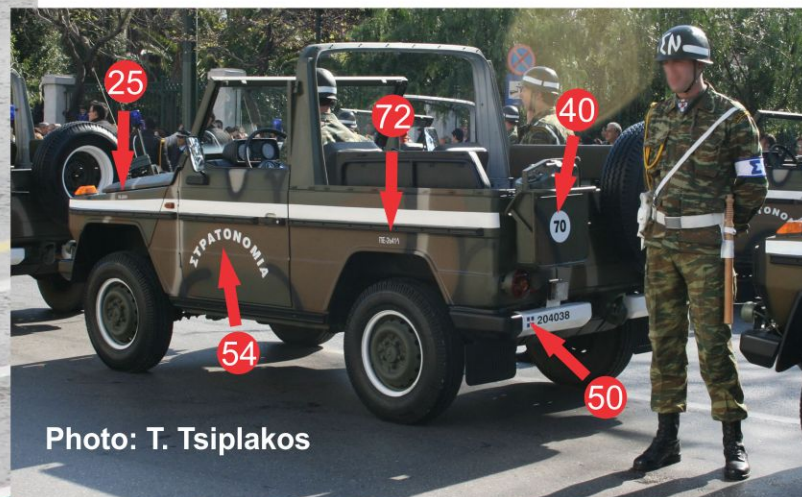
Both the tire pressure markings and the number plates were on metal plates fixed with screws.

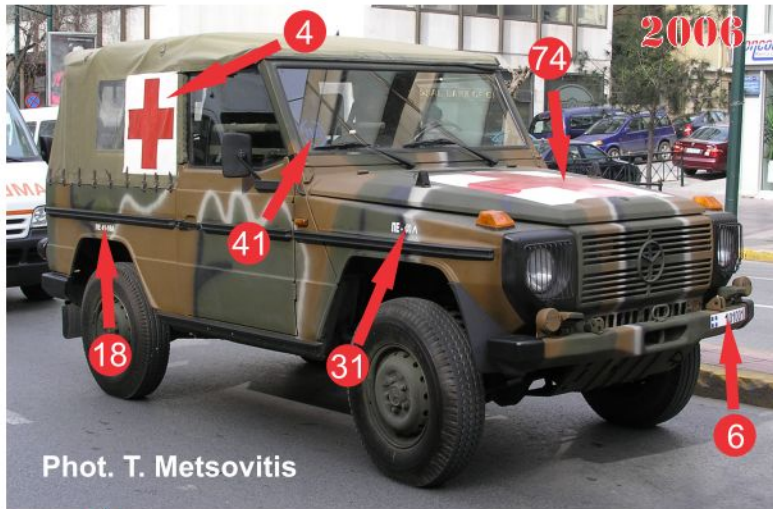


Military police vehicles always have a white trim. This is applied to the bumpers, front and rear, the front of the bonnet, the lower windscreen frame, above the waistline on the sides and to the tire rims.

This vehicle was a regular participant in the Independence Day parade in Athens and over the years changed slightly in appearance as it was repainted and also got another tilt.



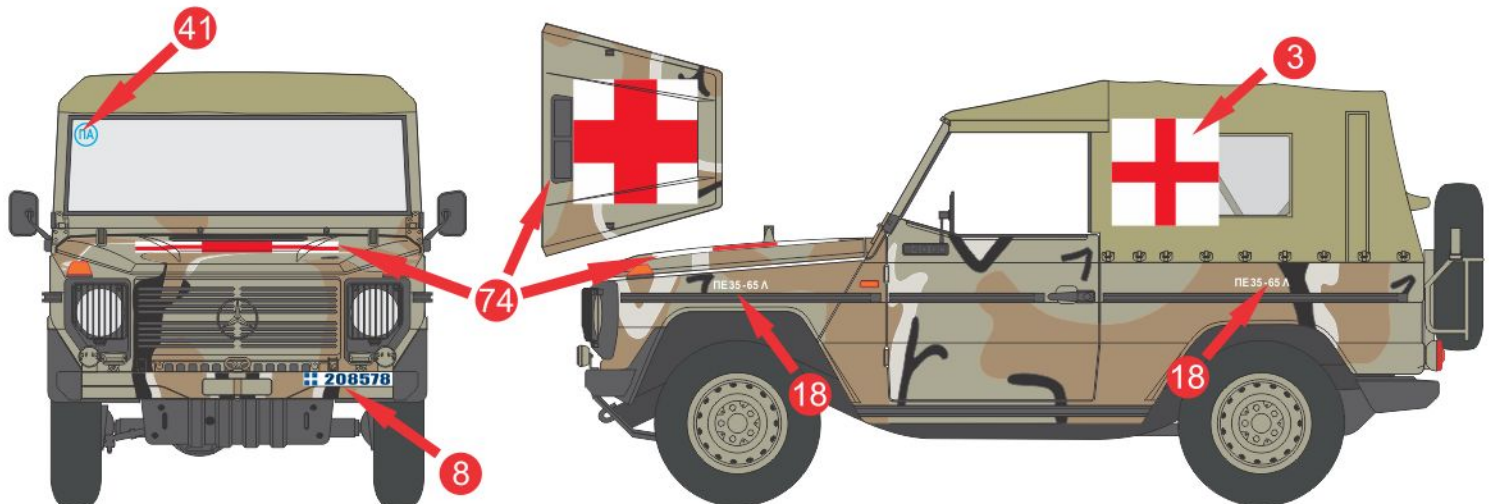
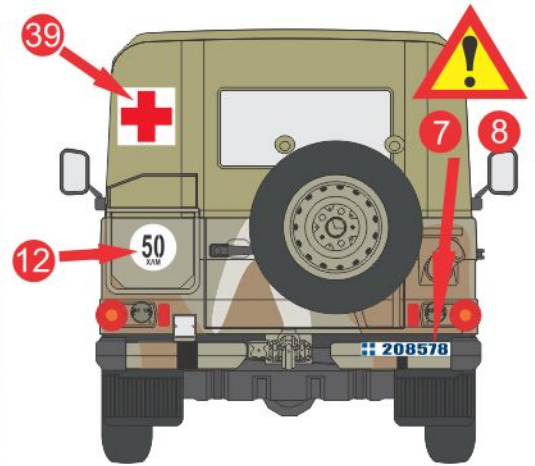

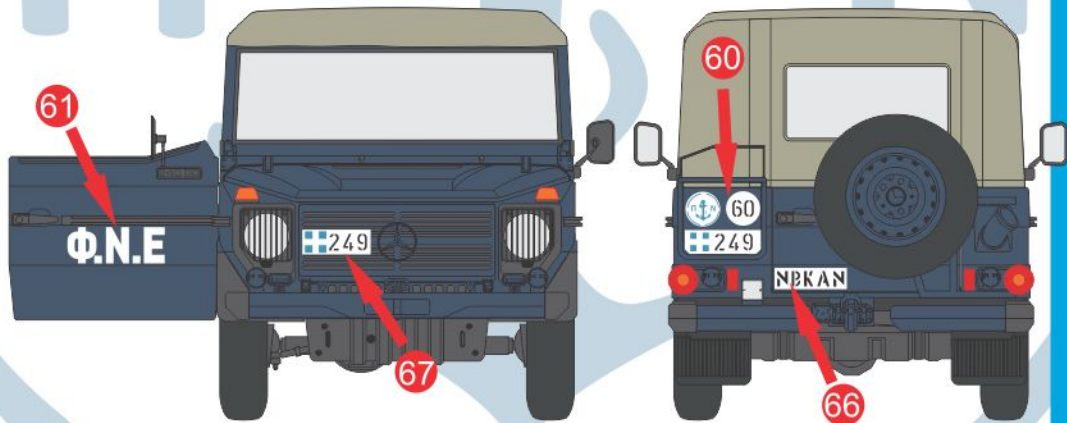
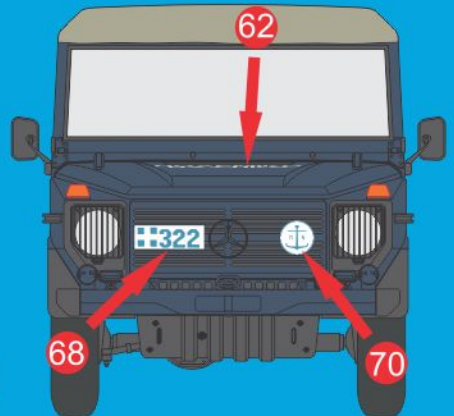
Salamina Naval Base central fire station 2009

Both the front number plate **68** and the naval insignia **70** were metal plates fixed to the radiator grill.

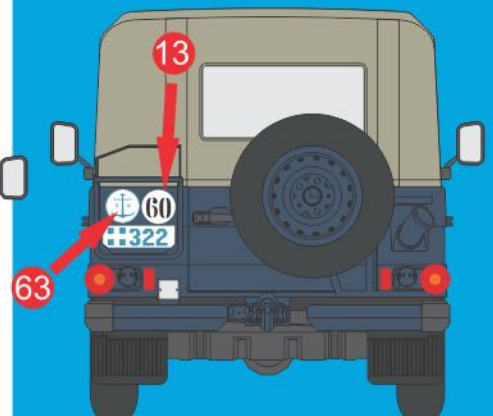
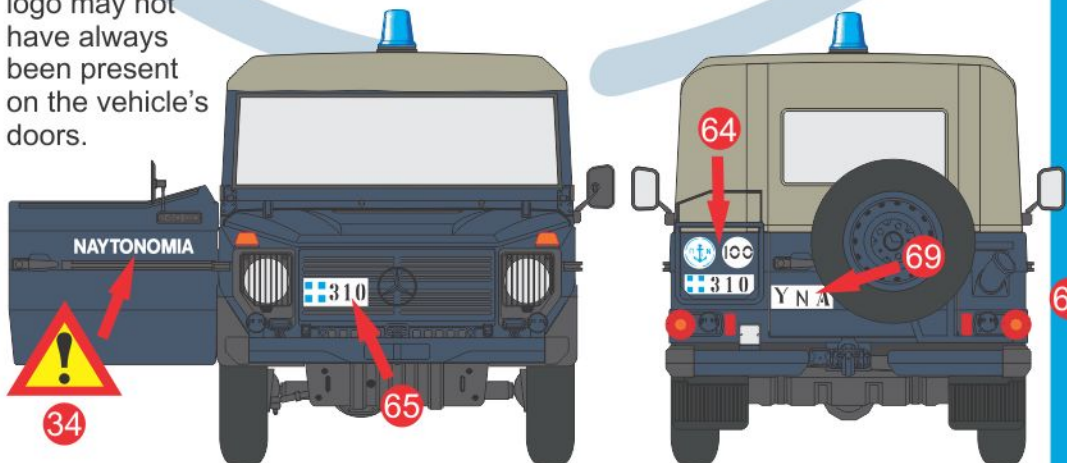


Naval Installation Guards 2013.

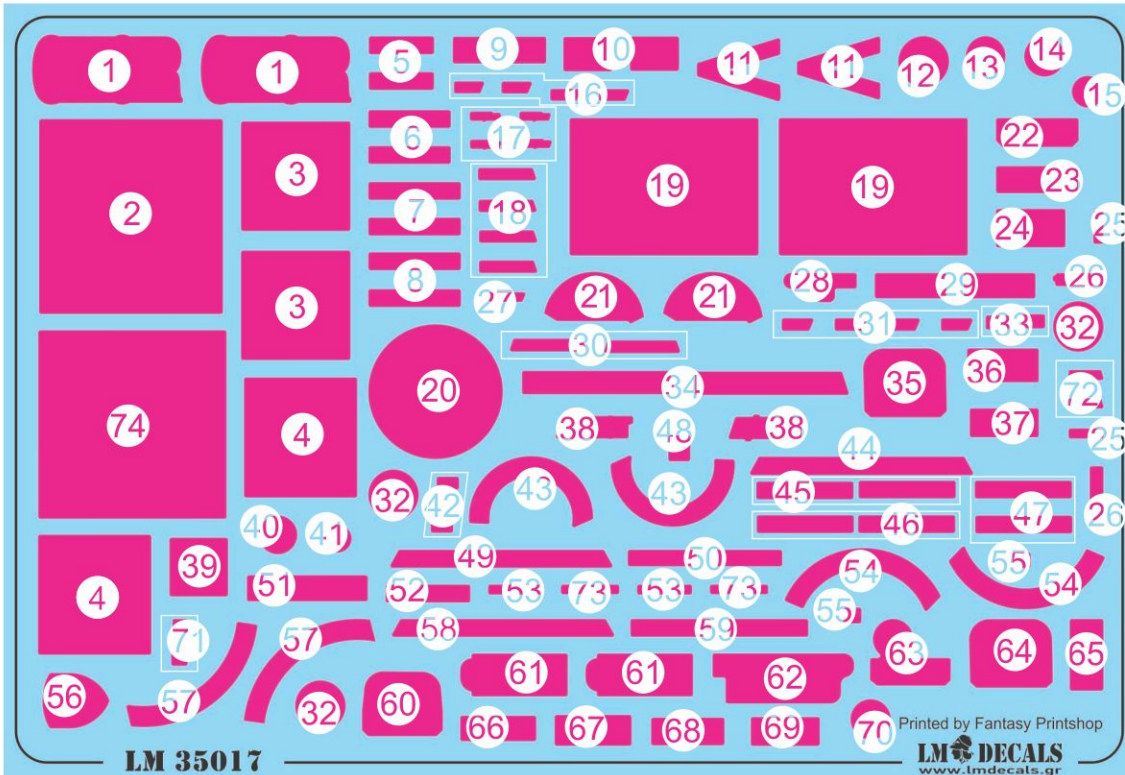

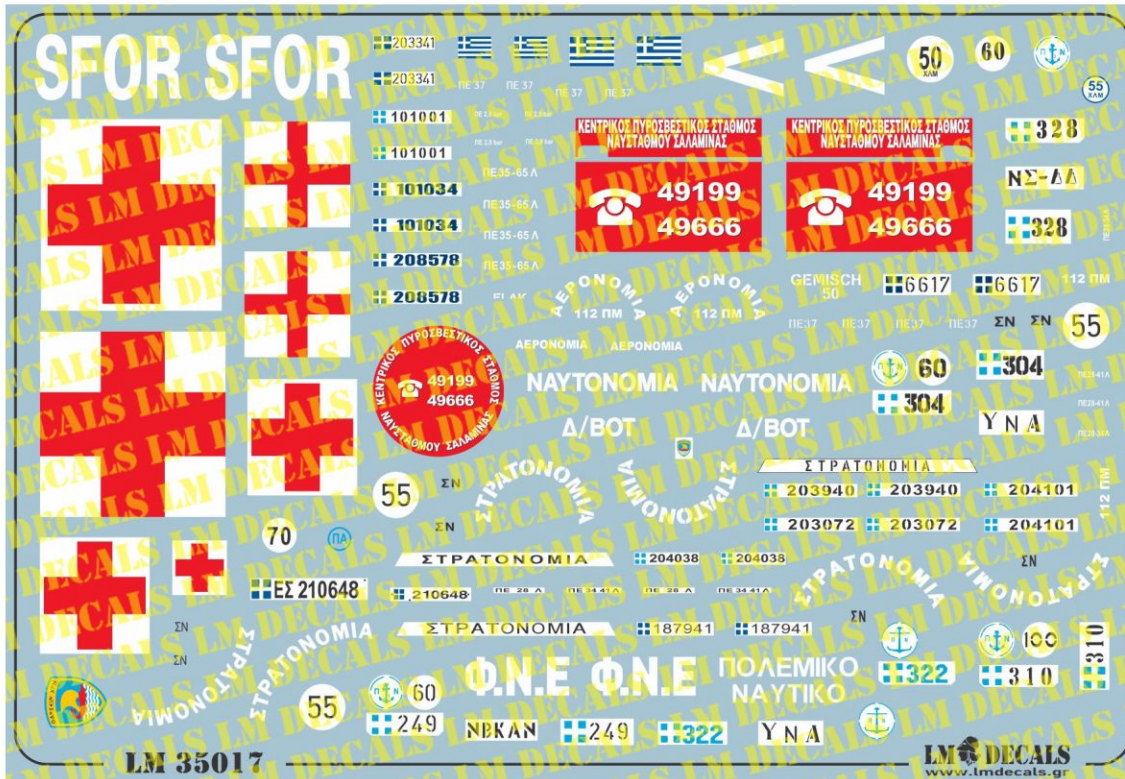
