





The M 24 in Hellenic Service




This is believed to be the M24's first public appearance in Athens, on 28th October 1950. These tanks belong to the armour school and carry its markings on the front plate. The leading tank also has the name "ALEXANDROS PAPAGOS" who at the time was the chief of the armed forces and the only ever officer in Greece to be awarded the rank of Field Marshal. When supplied these tanks were finished in the post-war shade of US Olive-drab. It is possible that for the parade they were repainted either in this shade or a similar one. No serial numbers appear to have been applied. The rear view is only speculative.














In 1967 Hellenic army markings were changed and standardised with NATO regulations. Vehicle numbers were now prefixed by a small Greek flag. The use of the national crest on the turret was discontinued.



With the adoption of the four colour camouflage, M24 light tanks were repainted probably using the MERDC pattern for the M48 tank. This was adapted to the smaller tank in keeping with the principles of the scheme but the results were never standard.
